Assignments	<p>There will be in-class and homework assignments on the materials being learned. Lab simulations will be a part of the course. Late assignments (any 10-point assignments turned in after initial collection at the <u>start</u> of class) will be accepted within one class meeting of original due date for half credit and should have the word "Late" written at the top. One "courtesy" 10-point assignment will be accepted for full credit if submitted within one class meeting after the due date. Accurate note taking will enable you to better retain the material and use it on assignments and in the future.</p> <p>There will be regular quizzes on the class material that <u>cannot</u> be made up if the student is absent. The only exam will be the final on the last day of class.</p> <p><i>Keep in mind that this is a short-term course with very few assignments. One missing assignment, quiz, or lab day could lower your grade substantially.</i></p>
